FORMER DEBT **COLLECTOR GETS** 2 YEARS FOR THEFT

A former Bank of America debt collector was sentenced Tuesday to two years in federal prison after she admitted stealing more than \$60,000 from customer accounts.

Martine K. Paul, 32, of Virginia Beach worked as a senior collector for the bank's downtown Norfolk office in 2010, according to federal prosecutors. Her main responsibility was to obtain payments from customers with overdue credit cards.

Paul admitted in court that on 65 occasions throughout 2010, she transferred money from several customers' accounts into her own, or to her creditors, such as student loan vendors, according to a court filing.
